

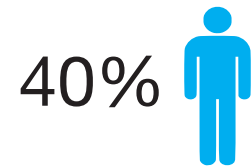
# The University and the City: Higher Education in Doha

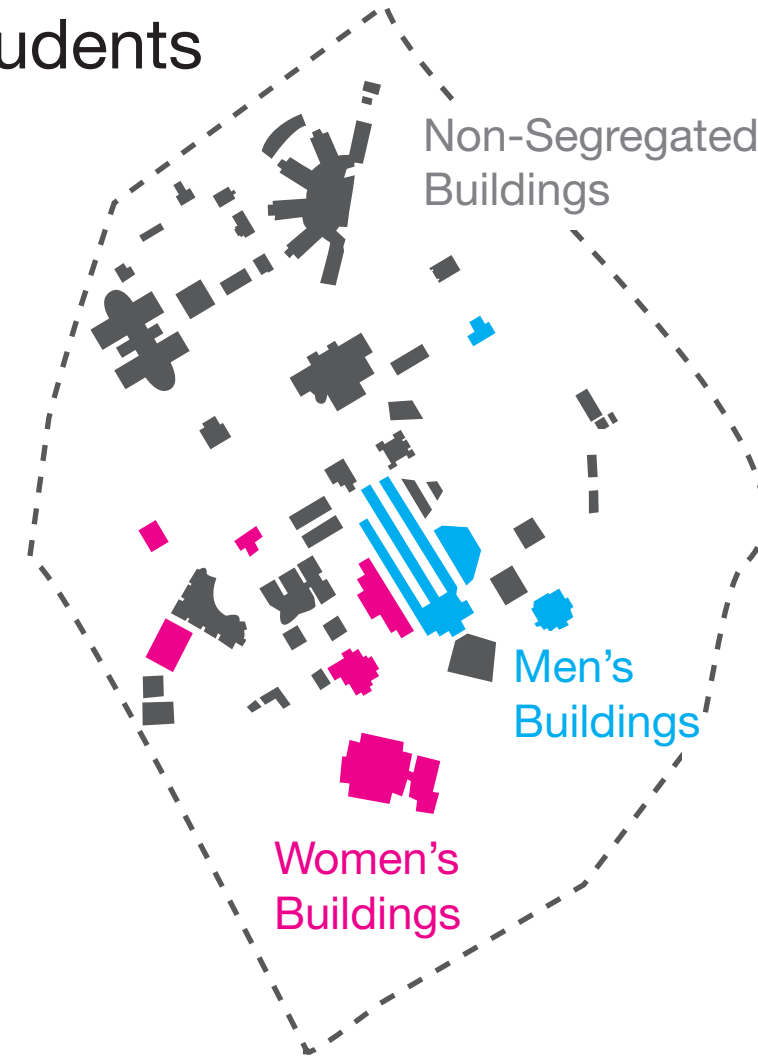
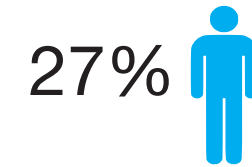
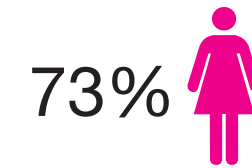
Non-Segregated Buildings
